## Service for a Year

Princeton in Africa matches talented and passionate college graduates with organizations working across Africa for yearlong service placements. Our Fellows help our host organizations make meaningful changes on the ground, and are forever changed themselves in the process. Since our founding in 1999, we've sent nearly 550 Fellows to Africa. They have helped improve education and public health, source fresh water and alternative energy, increase family incomes, and so much more.

## Commitment for a Lifetime

During their year of service, our Fellows create connections that last their lifetime. Some stay and continue to work in Africa; others leverage their experience to launch careers in international development. No matter where they go, our Fellows' experiences with Princeton in Africa transform their lives and perspectives about the world and their role within it.

## PiAf Alumni are Committed to Africa

- Over 95% of PiAf alumni report that they became stronger advocates for the African continent due to their fellowship.
- Nearly 77% of PiAf alumni report that they have returned to the African continent since their fellowship year.
- 40% of PiAf alumni report that they stayed on the African continent for work, research or study immediately following their fellowship.
- Nearly 50% of PiAf alumni report currently working with organizations directly or indirectly related to the African continent.
- Nearly 56% of PiAf alumni report volunteering or donating to organizations on the African continent during the last two years.

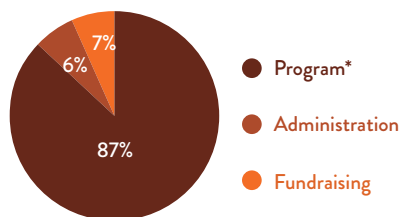

## Host Organizations Request PiAf Fellows Year After Year:

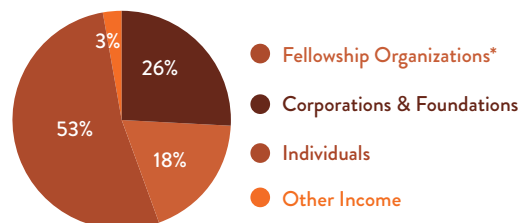
- More than a decade later, we still place Fellows with our very first host organization, the International Rescue Committee.
